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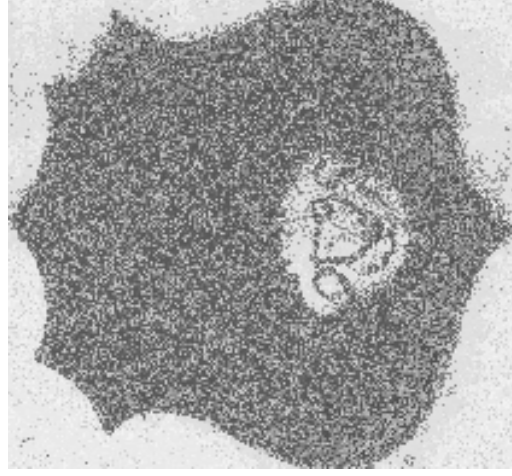

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## Headmaster's Foreword . . .

The establishment of James Ruse Agricultural High School as the fourth agricultural high in the State is a most significant development in rural education. It is now over twenty years since Farrer was set up to assist in the important work being carried out by Yanco and Hurlstone.

So great has been the contribution of these schools to the educational welfare of our State that we, of James Ruse, can feel assured that the value of and the demand for agricultural high schools is fully proved.

Unlike the other schools we are non-residential, have no extensive farm lands and are situated in the metropolitan area of one of the great cities of the world.

As yet we lack many of the material circumstances necessary for the education we are aiming to provide. A farm establishment complete with livestock section, biology and agricultural laboratories, assembly hall, gymnasium, tennis courts and paved areas are but a few of our major needs. An even more important deficiency is our lack of tradition and all that the word implies.

However, I find no lack of enthusiasm for the welfare of the school on the part of the staff, parents and pupils alike.

On taking over the school I was most agreeably impressed by the faith in its future shown by Mr. Mullavey and his energetic colleagues who had developed the school during the Annexe phase. Equally pleasing was my first meeting with the school prefects led by their Captain, Byron Sharpe, and Vice-Captain, Alan Bell. With men and boys of this type the future of James Ruse is assured.

The heavy responsibility of establishing a new high school is made ever so much lighter by the cheerful assistance, encouragement and at times forbearance of the parents of our pupils. The ladies who assist in the Canteen or with clerical duties, the parents who answer our appeal for funds so willingly, the donors of all manner of equipment, the mothers who aim to keep their lads so well turned out in the school uniform are deserving of our heartfelt thanks. Education to-day more than ever before is a trinity of effort involving pupil, parent and teacher.

Next year we have our first fourth year classes and take the final step towards a full high school in nature as well as in name. To the lads who pioneer our senior school I can promise nothing but hard work and added responsibility. Habits of study must be well founded and effort must be continuous if they are to attain a worthwhile Leaving Certificate.

The qualities of industry and perseverance were the very ones that gave James Ruse, for whom the school is named, his place in history. His pioneering efforts did much to shape the course of our Australian history. You lads in your way are pioneers too and in your turn you can do much for our great country.

# JAMES RUSE - THE FIRST SETTLER

A Short Biographical Note on the Pioneer After Whom This School was Named.

James Ruse was born in Launceston near Cornwall in 1760. Little is known of him except that he was "bred a husbandman". The knowledge of the land he acquired in his youth was to stand him in good stead in later life. At the age of 22 he was convicted at Bodmin Assizes and sentenced to seven years transportation (29th July, 1782). He was selected for transportation to Africa but, when the British Government abandoned that scheme, he served five years on board the prison hulk "Dunkirk", at Plymouth, prior to being sent out with the First Fleet to serve what remained of his term at Botany Bay.

Very soon after their arrival in New South Wales, the settlers faced the threat of starvation. Although the rations supplied to it were expected to last two years, many of them had rotted and much of the grain had been destroyed by sea-water on the voyage out. It was soon found that the growing of food was going to be much more difficult than had previously been imagined. The soil was unsuitable ("No country offers less assistance to the first settlers than this does", wrote Phillip); the agricultural implements sent were hopelessly inadequate; the convicts were lazy and had no knowledge of farming; only three men, Phillip, Henry Edward Dodd (his personal servant) and James Ruse had had experience on the land.

After an abortive attempt had been made to cultivate the land around Sydney Cove, Dodd was sent with one hundred convicts (including Ruse) to set up a government farm in the more fertile district of Rose Hill. The first harvest recorded in N.S.W. was brought in in December, 1789, "about two hundred bushels of wheat and sixty of barley with a small quantity of flax, Indian corn, and oats", all of which was preserved for seed. The crop was a poor one and Phillip was dubious as to whether the cultivation of the soil would ever return sufficient to repay the labour expended.

Just previous to this, however, he had begun an experiment. "In order to know in what time a man might be able to cultivate a sufficient quantity of ground to support himself", he in November, 1789, "ordered a but to be built in a good situation, an acre of ground to be cleared, and once turned up it was put into the possession of a very industrious convict who was told if he behaved well he should have 30 acres". The "very industrious convict" was James Ruse whose term had expired in the August of that year and who, most probably, begged Phillip to be allowed to settle on the land. Ruse was to be "clothed and supplied with the ration issued from the public store for fifteen months". He was given grain for sowing his ground for the first year, the necessary implements of husbandry, two sow pigs, six hens and, for a short time, the help of another convict. Phillip named the farm Experiment Farm.

By perseverance and industry, by applying his own methods of cultivation rather than copying those in use on the government farm where the land was "just scratched over" and despite the plundering raids of the convicts ("The greatest check upon me is the dishonesty of the convicts, who, in spite of my vigilance, rob me almost every night"), Ruse was able to declare himself self-supporting in fifteen months (25th February, 1791), thereby justifying Phillip's faith in him and disproving the opinion then current

## The Prefects

The ceremony for the induction of Prefects into Office was held during First Term and was attended by parents, relatives and friends of the Prefects, Staff and students of the school. The opening address was given by the Headmaster who welcomed the visitors.

Mr. Shearman, Master-in-Charge of Prefects, then spoke of the significance of the occasion and traced the history of the settlement of the school and how this was building a tradition. He then spoke of the duties and responsibilities of the Prefects, of their authority, and their need for high standards of leadership.

Mr. Shearman then called upon parents of the Prefects to pin on the badges of office, and each Prefect in turn then signed the Prefects' Register.

The Prefect Body then repeated the pledge,

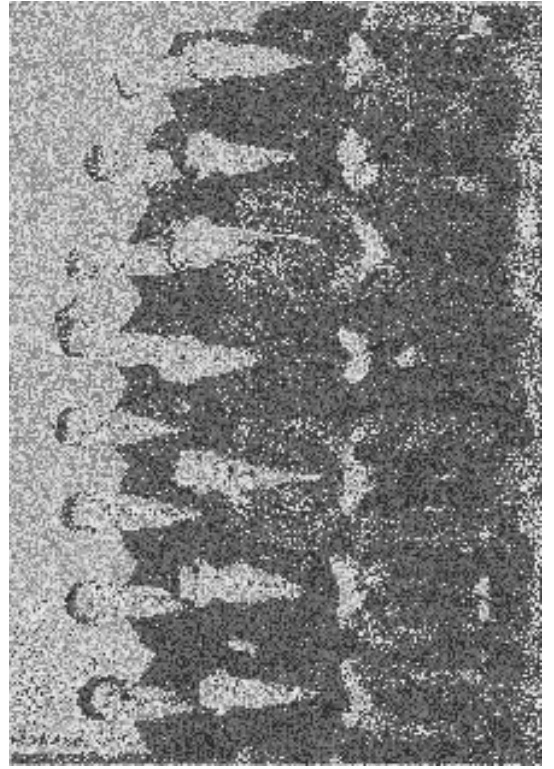
"We realize the honour bestowed upon us in being chosen as Prefects and we solemnly pledge ourselves to uphold the dignity and honour of this office.

We will carry out our duties to the best of our ability and will foster a spirit of worthwhile endeavour in every phase of school life.

We will set a standard worthy of our office and, in so doing, bring prestige and honour to our school".

The Deputy Headmaster then addressed the student body on the need for their full co-operation with and their respect for the Prefects.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, parents and friends were entertained at morning tea in the Headmaster's office.



in the colony "that a man could not live in this country". Ruse had demonstrated that a man could.

Phillip remembered the promise he had made and on March 30th, 1791, Ruse was "put in possession of an allotment of 30 acres of the ground in the situation he then occupied". This was the first land grant made in Australian history. Later this grant was recalled and an official deed or grant, bearing the Seal of Territory, was issued to Ruse in its place (February 25th, 1792).

During the experiment, Ruse had married Elizabeth Perry (5th September, 1790) who had arrived with the Second Fleet. In December, 1791, he proudly announced that he would no longer draw rations from the public store for his wife and child. Phillip was so impressed by the industry of the man and his wife that he granted Elizabeth a full pardon in July, 1792, and thus she became the first woman to receive a pardon in the new settlement.

In 1793, Ruse, disappointed with his crop after a severe drought season, sold Experiment Farm to Surgeon Harris for forty pounds (probably the first private land sale in New South Wales). He seems to have been so disheartened at the time that he thought of returning to England. Nevertheless his spirit does not seem to have been quenched for long (one of his favourite sayings was "Man is like an old dip candle — he shines the brighter for a little snuffing"), for in 1794 he was again playing the role of pioneer, helping to open up the Hawkesbury district. From then on he held land in various parts of the settlement, at Bankstown, Windsor and Riverstone. Often, particularly during the years 1804 to 1811, he would supplement his earning from his farm by working as a seaman on various coastal vessels.

Ruse spent his declining years in the Campbelltown district where he died on September 5th, 1837, aged 77 years. Our first settler was buried in the St. John's Cemetery at Campbelltown where his grave is marked by a headstone bearing the following quaint inscription:—

I. H. S.  
Gloria in Axvelis.  
Secred  
to the memery  
of James Ruse, who  
departed this life  
Sept. 5, in the year of  
houre Lord. 1837, natef  
of Cornwall, and arived  
in this coloney by the  
Forst Fleet, aged 77.  
My mother rearad me tenderley,  
With me she took much paines;  
And when I arived in this coloney,  
I sowed the forst grain;  
And now with my Heavenly Father,  
I hope for ever to remain.

## PRACTICAL AGRICULTURE THE SCHOOL FARM

All students at our school have two periods of Practical Agriculture each week. The aim of this course is, as with other sciences, to explain and amplify the theory work. Therefore we are more interested in designing our practical work to illustrate basic scientific principles and to develop the students' powers of observation than to give detailed training in agricultural techniques. Our school farm is a land laboratory rather than a commercial enterprise.

The farm is some eight acres in extent. It is divided into a cultivated section for teaching the principles of crop husbandry and a livestock section. Development of the cropping section is almost completed and provides for:-

1. An extensive vegetable garden.
2. An orchard with over 100 fruit trees of all types.
3. An experimental area with some 150 standard plots for demonstration and experimental purposes.
4. A field crop section.

The whole area is irrigated by fixed spray lines.

The livestock section is still in the planning stage. An intensive, skillion type poultry unit has been designed and plans are being made to provide for a limited number of dairy cows and sheep. Experimental pasture areas and an arboretum will be included in this section.

Our farm equipment includes a Ferguson Tractor with a range of attachments, three Howard Rotary Hoes, an Atco and two Victoria mowers.

The ground floor of the picturesque old Felton coach house has been renovated and remodelled to provide a series of storage sheds for machinery, tools, fuel, seeds and fertilizer.

**Notable achievements for 1959 include:-**

1. The appointment of Mr. Adams as a farm caretaker. One of his chief functions is to carry out the routine work of limited educational value so that the students' time is not wasted on such tasks.
2. The addition to the mechanised equipment of the latest 6 h.p. Howard Rotary Hoe, complete with all attachments, and two Victoria mowers.
3. The planting of 64 fruit trees in the orchard.
4. The setting out and planting of the experimental plot section.
5. The erection of a glasshouse for propagation and experimental purposes.
6. The initiation of the diary system. All pupils are required to take notes in the field and record these in the Farm Diaries.
7. The commencement of a planned programme of agricultural excursions. These excursions are designed to extend the instruction possible at the school to selected farms and other places of agricultural interest.
8. The development and equipping of a section of the farm shed for proper repair and maintenance of farm machinery and tools.
9. The preparation of detailed plans and specifications for an intensive poultry unit.
10. The introduction of a system whereby pupils can buy the produce of the farm at very reasonable rates.  
This has led to the building up of a farm fund for purchasing items of agricultural equipment and amenities for the students.
11. The preparation of plans and specifications to alter a shed near the farm to provide storage for produce and hand tools.
12. The development of a liaison with the Department of Agriculture. Already Mr. J. V. E. McGrath, Fruit Officer, and Mr. Smith, Poultry Officer, have visited the school to advise on various matters.

## Junior Farmers' Club

The high quality of our display at this show won high praise from the judges.

The Advisory Committee has been very active on our behalf and our thanks go to all its members for their wonderful support. Our thanks also go to Mr. J. W. Webb, our Area Supervisor, for his unflinching help and encouragement.

Many visits were made by club members, the most interesting one being to Camden Park Estate, No. 2 Dairy.

All members are eagerly looking forward to our next Achievement Day to be held on December 5th.

During October we had our first debate against Blacktown Junior Farmers' Club. The topic was "That Women Should Receive Equal Rights with Men". Our team was: P. Robey (captain), J. Burns and R. Adams. We congratulate our team on their victory.

## OUR LIBRARY

the school is very proud of its library building, which stands apart from the classrooms, and is surrounded by lawns and shrubs. The building is pleasingly painted inside in pastel colours and decorated with works of art, indoor plants and fish tanks.

**During the year many additions were made to the Library, chief of which are:—**

1. 478 books were added, bringing the total to 1000. Two outstanding purchases were The Encyclopaedia Britannica, and The Shorter Oxford Dictionary.
2. The Annual Appeal to parents for funds yielded £1841814, which amount has been used in purchasing books.
3. During the year additional items of furniture included bookshelves, a dictionary stand, and blinds, which add considerably to the appearance of the Library, as well as to the comfort of the readers.
4. A typewriter has been placed in the Library for the use of the Library staff.
5. Through the generosity of Mr. H. A. Crompton, the tropical fish-tank was filled with plants, fish, and the necessary apparatus in the form of electric pump, filter, thermometer and ornaments.
6. Gifts of indoor plants by the people of the school has done much to add to the beauty of the Library Reading Room.
7. Six reproductions of famous works of art have been added to those already on the walls.
8. John Lewis, of 2B, presented a large photograph of great historical interest to the Library. This photograph shows many well-known sailing ships at anchor in Circular Quay, Jan., 1871.
9. Two valuable display cases have been obtained for use in the Library so that special books, books of great value or historical material may be placed on display.
10. Agricultural Gazettes are now obtained from the Agriculture Departments of all the States of the Commonwealth.
11. Finally, mention must be made of a very valuable addition in the form of a special section of the Library where agricultural pamphlets from the various State Agriculture Departments have been filed. It was through the generous help of W. B. Hodges Pty. Ltd., Auburn, and Rumseys Seeds Pty. Ltd., Parramatta, that this has been possible, as they donated the money for the purchase and printing of the special manilla folders in which the pamphlets have been filed.

## The School Grounds

The pleasant surroundings provided by well-planned and maintained gardens, lawns and paved areas do much for the tone of the school.

The plan for landscaping the grounds at James Ruse was prepared by Mr. A. Wilson, Chief Landscape Designer at the Royal Botanic Gardens, and is exhibited complete in all details in the school library.

Implementation of the scheme is in the capable hands of Mr. A. Shearman, and already considerable progress has been made in establishing lawns and shrubberies and forming roadways and parking areas.

To finance this work an Appeal was made to parents who donated £90 for the purpose.

### Features of progress during 1959 were:—

1. Discussions were held with officers of the Department of Education and Public Works as to the pressing need for paved areas, drainage and terracing. These resulted in the drawing up of a detailed plan of improvements which will be carried out in several stages.

## British Commonwealth Day

Our school function to celebrate this important day was capably handled by our school captain, Byron Sharpe, who performed his duties as Chairman with confidence. Our visitor for the occasion was our District Inspector, Mr. J. H. Thompson, B.A., who was welcomed by our vice-captain, Ian Bell.

In his opening address Byron stated that Australia is an important part of the British Commonwealth of Nations and that her greatness is in no small part due to the work of some outstanding agriculturists. He added that, as this is an Agricultural High School, it was fitting that we consider the work of some of these men.

Our speakers were A. Bell who read a message from the President of the British Commonwealth Day Movement, followed by I. Brothers (James Ruse), A. Wolfendale (Captain John Macarthur), I. Fowler (William Farrer), R. Steurwald (Ridley and McKay), C. Hill (Pridham), B. Dennis (The Chaffey Brothers), J. More (Professor Waterhouse), and D. Cadwallader (Thomas Sutcliffe Mort).

Proceedings were enlivened by Class 1A with their pleasant singing of "Waltzing Matilda" and "Advance Australia Fair", and Class 2A boys with their verse speaking of "My Country" and "Song of the Wheat".

In his closing address Byron Sharpe stressed the fact that the great men spoken of at this assembly all possessed these common qualities, namely, INDUSTRY, PERSEVERENCE and VISION, and added that the students of this school can play their part in keeping Australia in the forefront of the great nations by following the advice of our school motto, "DEEDS — NOT WORDS".

Mr. Thompson then presented a book prize, donated by our Headmaster, to B. Dennis who, in his opinion, had been the outstanding speaker.

Proceedings were brought to a close with the singing of the National Anthem.

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## SCHOOL PLAYING AREAS

With the increase of pupils enrolled at the Annexe in 1958, it was evident that playing areas in the vicinity were not capable of providing sufficient space for all the schools who desired to participate in competitive sport. It thus became necessary to send teams further and further afield on sports afternoons, with a consequent increase in the time spent in travelling and a great deal of interruption to normal school routine.

At the beginning of that year also, the services of a qualified instructor in Physical Education were made available to the school. This meant that the pupils not only received instruction in the formal side of Physical Education but also that gymnastics, parallel and horizontal bar work, athletics and field games were taught for the first time. This further highlighted the need for a suitable playing field of our own.

Early in third term it was decided to appeal to parents for donations towards the construction of an oval at the School. The response was very good and within two weeks sufficient money was promised to permit surveying of the area, specifications and tenders to be called. On 30th September, 1959, a proposal was put before the Department of Education requesting the carrying out of certain earth works in the School grounds to provide a suitable full size Sport's Oval. The cost of construction was to be met by the School and Parents subsidised on a £ for £ basis by the Department. Final approval was received before the completion of the School year and the successful contractor, as promised, completed the levelling of the area before first term commenced in 1959.

During the current year this playing field has proved of great value for all forms of Physical Education activity. At the present time it is being prepared for the sowing of couch grass and will be available early in 1960 for full time use.

During 1958, also, an excellent Cricket Practice wicket was established and an area prepared for a second.

Arrangements are in hand for the paving of an area of some size between the machinery shed and showers for the playing of basketball and similar games. It is hoped early in the new year to commence the planning and construction of tennis courts at the front of the school adjacent to the Electricity Sub-Station.
